Duration Approximately 12 minutes

It is suggested that in live performance, this piece be accompanied by visual aids like large cards on a stand or easel with the name of each movement and its definition (visual imagery is encouraged). The flutist (or a "page-turner") should flip the movement titles in order during the performance. It's also possible to use an overhead projection in place of cards. If the native language of the audience is not English, the cards should have the English "Fl___" titles with translations next to them.

Movements:

1. Flânerie

French - strolling about aimlessly; sauntering; "a person who walks the city in order to experience it."

2. Fluster

to put into a state of agitated confusion; to excite and confuse with drink.

3. Flyswatter

a device for killing flies, mosquitoes, and other insects.

4. Flippant

frivolously disrespectful, shallow, or lacking in seriousness.

5. Fluphenazine

a potent tranquilizer derived from phenothiazine and used in various forms for the management of certain neurological or psychotic disorders.

6. Floating

being buoyed up on water or other liquid; having little or no attachment to a particular place; moving from one place to another.


7. Flit

to move lightly and swiftly; fly, dart, or skim along.

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Performance Notes:

<p>pizz.</p>	Tongue pizzicato (AKA “slap tongue”)
<p>pizz/slap</p>	Tongue pizzicato with Key Click
	Standard Key Click
<p>Jet Whistle</p>	Jet Whistle
	Transition from normal tone to ½ breathy tone back to normal tone
	It is understood and expected that the high C-natural harmonic in this phrase will be slightly flat.
	In this notation for the piano, the player should use an open palm to create a cluster of white and black notes centered approximately around the indicated range. Precision or hitting of specific note values are not to be considered.
